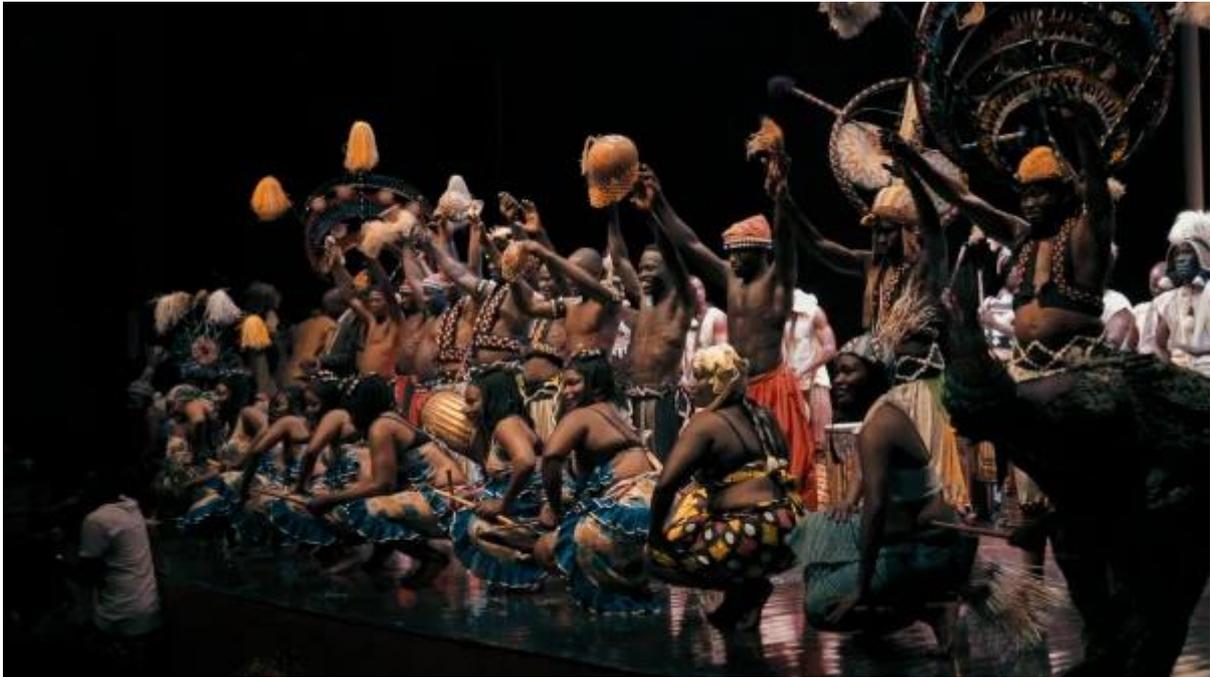
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A Visa-Vise: The Suspense of Les Ballets Africains' 12-City U.S. Tour

In a dubious start to Black History Month, the highly anticipated 12-city, ten state tour by **Les Ballets Africains** has been put into limbo by the ongoing refusal of the U.S. consulate to approve visas for the celebrated West African dance and drumming ensemble. The February tour was announced long before a January 2026 executive order that largely banned visas for designated countries, including Guinea where **Les Ballets Africains** is the national dance company. Press accounts indicate that even after Guinea provided the ensemble with official government passports, the U.S. embassy in Guinea still has not issued visas. The visas have not been denied, but are in “administrative hold,” placing the visa applications, and the tour, in suspense.

As a result, the initial performances at two theaters in Florida were cancelled. With hope the visas would be issued and the tour would go forward, the two California theaters in Santa Barbara and Malibu held out until two days before the scheduled shows before announcing their cancellation. New Mexico was the next to cancel. As the calendar approaches the remaining venues, the company has no word on the visas' status and remains in a state of limbo. The remaining performances in Colorado, Missouri, Virginia, Maryland, New Jersey, and Connecticut have not yet cancelled the shows, but the venues caution ticket purchasers about the uncertainty, not likely to boost sales.

Originally formed in 1952 by Guinean choreographer Keita Fodeba, **Les Ballets Africains** toured internationally from a base in Paris until Guinean independence in 1958 when Les Ballets Africains became the country's national dance company. From its home country, the ensemble continued as ambassadors of African dance, music, and culture, touring the world and the U.S., including performances on Broadway. The company's history and international recognition may explain the reluctance to simply cancel the tour as well as the efforts to expedite approval of the visas.

Beyond efforts through official channels, a grass roots campaign has sprouted on social media. Southern California, in particular, has a raft of West African dance and drumming groups, and many credit **Les Ballets Africains** for both building an audience and igniting performers to form local West African dance and drumming ensembles. Many of those local artists are urging e-mails to the U.S. Embassy in Guinea where the visas are in administrative limbo, urging the Consul General to approve the visas so the rest of the tour might be salvaged.

Les Ballets Africains is only one of the situations of international artists encountering similar visa obstructions. Still, the timing of the visa denial of internationally acclaimed African artists during the U.S.-designated Black History Month is particularly bad optics and can only add to worries for visitors to the U.S. for the upcoming World Cup matches and Olympic events.

This type of crown generally lasts the longest and is an excellent choice for out-of-sight molars.

One drawback of metal crowns is their color. The metallic finish makes them less appealing for teeth within the visible part of your smile.

Porcelain-fused-to-metal (PFM) crowns

Porcelain-fused-to-metal crowns are another common option for dental patients. This type of crown uses the durability of metal and the natural appearance of porcelain to create a strong and aesthetically pleasing crown. They are another long-lasting option for patients.

PFM crowns are used to restore both front and back teeth. Some drawbacks of PFM crowns are that they can chip and reveal the metal finish underneath the porcelain, and they can wear down the enamel on surrounding teeth.

All-ceramic or porcelain crowns

All-ceramic or porcelain crowns are ideal for front teeth or pre-molars due to their natural appearance. They mimic the look of your natural enamel with a tooth-colored finish. Ceramic crowns are gentler on surrounding teeth than other types of crowns, resulting in less enamel wear.

Porcelain crowns are excellent for people who want to be discreet about having a dental crown. It's very hard to spot a porcelain crown. Porcelain is also considered bio-compatible, meaning people with allergies won't have to worry about an allergic reaction.

Zirconia crowns

Dental crowns made of zirconia are very strong and durable but often aren't as natural-looking as all-porcelain crowns.² Zirconia is a ceramic material commonly used for dental crowns for their strength and longevity. It also is bio-compatible to ease the mind of those with allergies.

One drawback of zirconia crowns is their opaque appearance, making them stand out from other teeth. It can be difficult for dentists to match the color of your natural teeth with zirconia crowns.

Pressed ceramic crowns

Pressed ceramic crowns have a translucent look similar to natural teeth. This type of crown is similar to a PFM, but the hard inner core is ceramic instead of metal. A dental lab technician presses ceramic at a high temperature to create the core. The downside of pressed ceramic crowns is that the layers of ceramic can chip away over time and create an uneven appearance.

Resin crowns

Resin crowns are less expensive but more prone to breakage than other crown types. Resin is commonly used for temporary crowns. They can last up to five years with a good oral care routine.

Same-day dental crowns

Sometimes, dentists use CAD/CAM (computer-aided design and manufacturing) technology for same-day dental crowns. The dentist will take digital dental impressions, and the custom crown will be created by an on-site milling machine.

The machine uses a solid block of ceramic to carve out your custom crown. Same-day crowns are very convenient, only requiring one visit. However, not everyone is eligible for this type of crown. Speak to your dentist to see if this option is available to you.

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Timeless Wedding Decor Ideas That'll Never Go Out of Style

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The Chemistry of Trust in Art and Archives

Each culture possesses its own precious things: paintings which feel like memory, writings which contain a language, photographs which prove a life has been lived. Around those objects, a quiet economy of trust forms. People trust labels in museums, certificates in galleries, dates in catalogs, even the way a work “looks right” in a room. A curator might request non-invasive imaging before any material is touched. These steps are built on restraint. The best cultural science is respectful science.

Even with high-tech equipment, so much depends on basics: proper preparation of materials, controlled material, clean handling, documentation, and repeatable methods. 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Wuthering Heights

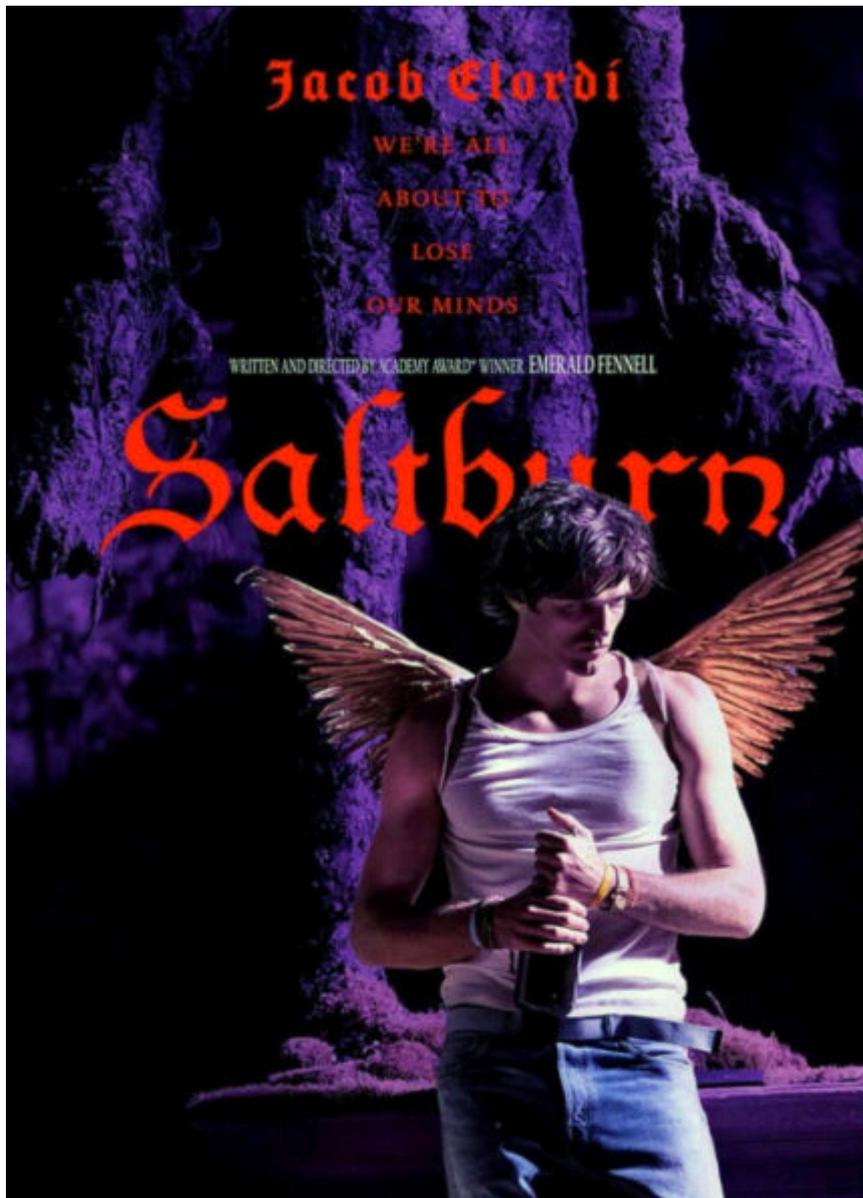

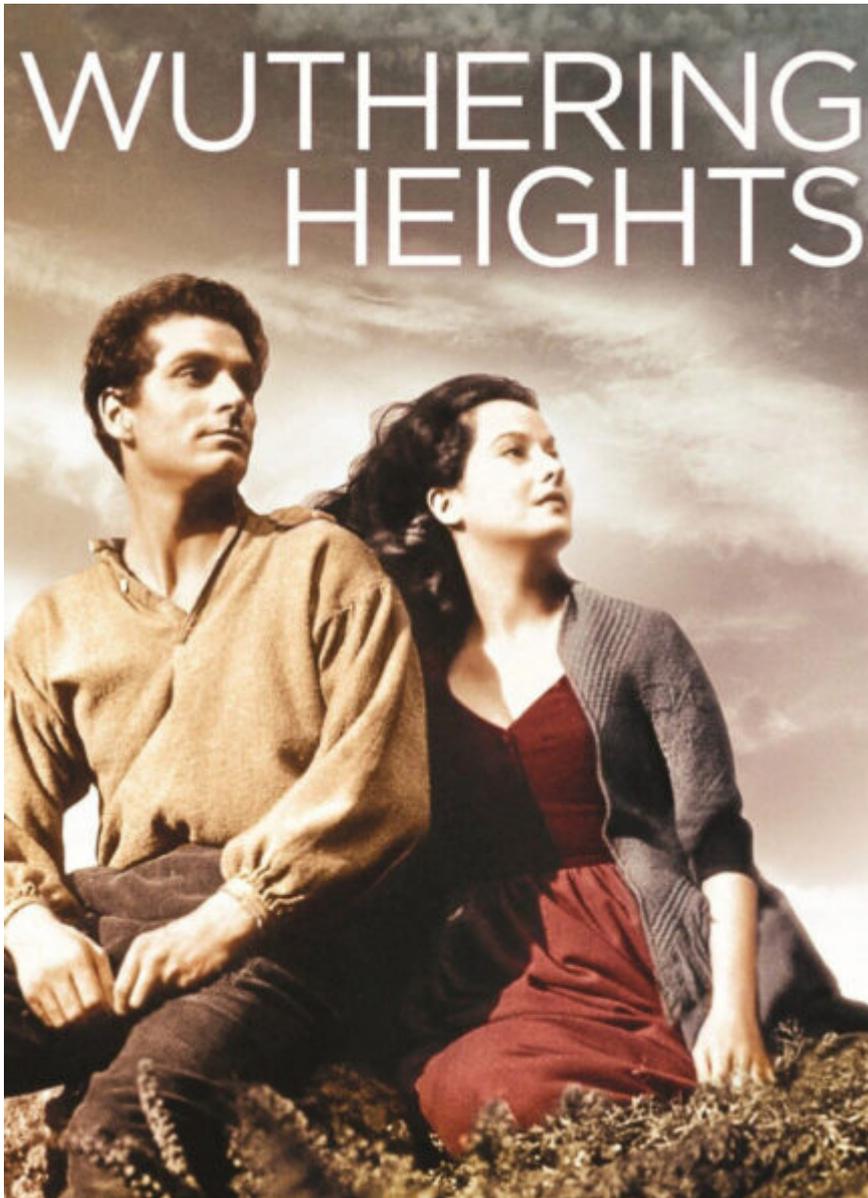

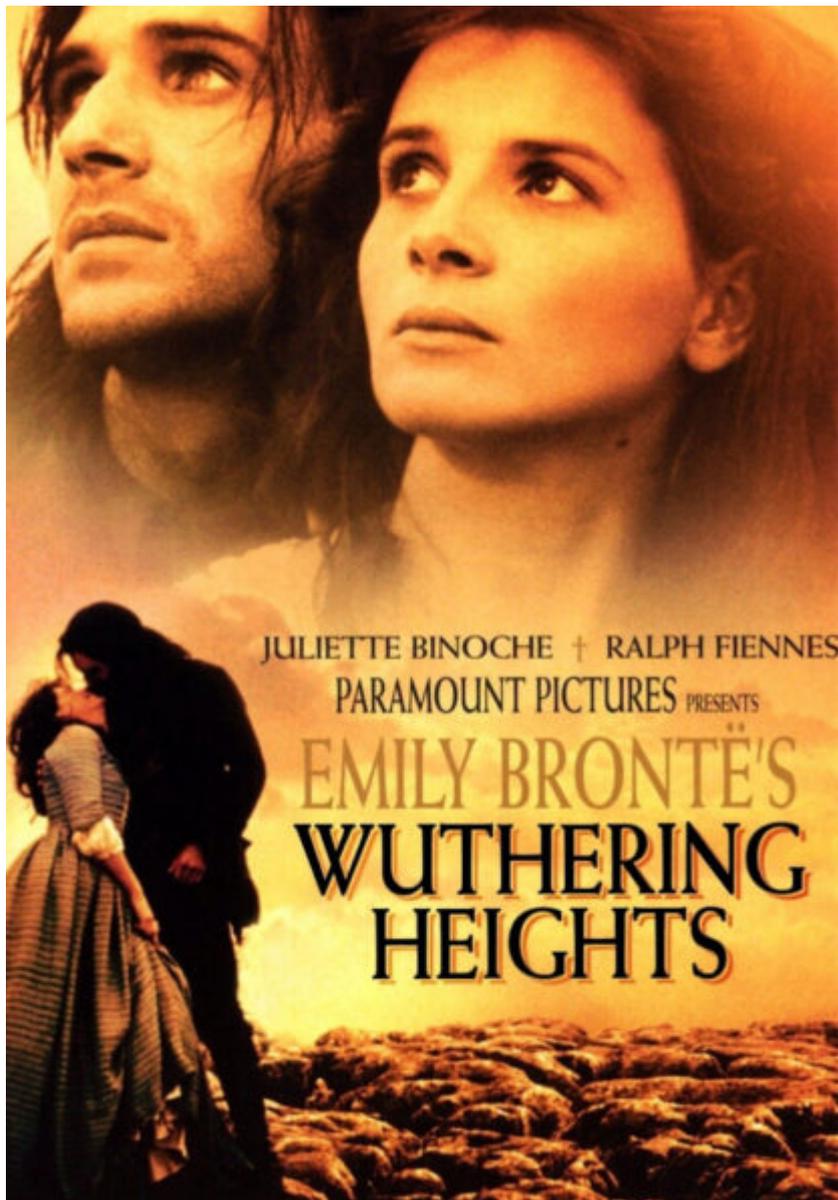
I enjoyed this young British woman's take-no-prisoners approach to filmmaking, so I was looking forward to her movie version of *Wuthering Heights* from the 1847 novel by Emily Brontë, and I was not disappointed.



Margot Robbie, who produced Fennell's first two movies and this one, plays Cathy. Jacob Elordi, who starred in *Saltburn*, is Heathcliff. Alison Oliver, who played Venetia, Felix sister in *Saltburn*, is Isabella. Hong Chau is Nelly. Owen Cooper of *Adolescence* is young Heathcliff.



I had seen them before, but I rewatched on streaming the 1939 *Wuthering Heights* directed by William Wyler (shot in Black and White by cinematographer Gregg Toland) starring Laurence Olivier and Merle Oberon, with David Niven as Edgar and Geraldine Fitzgerald as Isabelle, his sister.



And the 1992 version *Emily Brontë's Wuthering Heights* by Peter Kosminsky with Ralph Fiennes and Juliette Binoche. I did not read the novel, that is in one of my many bookshelves, but I put it on my nightstand with the pile of books to read.



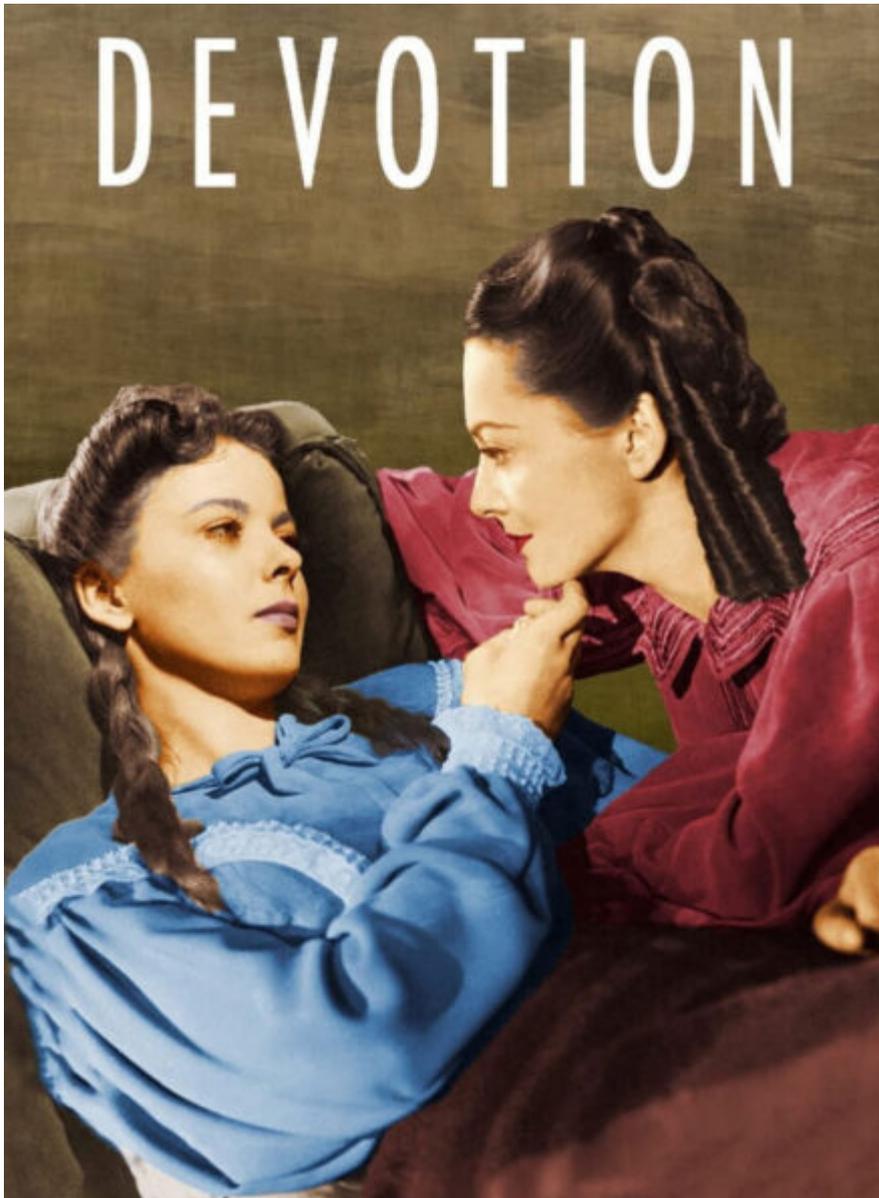

I also have *Jane Eyre*, the 1847 novel by [Charlotte Brontë](#), the older sister, and the DVD of the 2011 movie *Jane Eyre* by Cary Joji Fukunaga with Mia Wasikowska and Michael Fassbender.

I researched the life and works of these three sisters, including youngest sister [Anne Brontë](#), who wrote two novels: *Agnes Grey* and *The Tenant of Wildfell Hall*.

Charlotte wrote three more: *Shirley*, *Villette*. a reworking of her first novel *The Professor*.



Some years ago I had seen *Devotion* (1946) with Olivia De Havilland as Charlotte Brontë and Ida Lupino as Emily, but don't quite remember it. I might rewatch it.

The **Brontë family** was unusual for the 1800s in that the five daughters, and not just the one son Bronwell, were sent to boarding school or educated at home.

Their novels are hiding a feminist subtext, as explored in the 1979 book *The Madwoman in the Attic: The Woman Writer and the Nineteenth-Century Literary Imagination*, about the works of Victorian writers: Charlotte and Emily Brontë, Jane Austen, Mary Shelley, George Eliot, Elizabeth Barrett Browning, Christina Rossetti and Emily Dickinson.



You may [watch the trailer](#) if you don't mind spoilers, however I suggest you experience this new *Wuthering Heights* version, bursting with colors, extravagant costumes and sets, not to mention passionate sex scenes (not included in the novel or previous versions), in the darkness of a movie theatre by immersing yourself inside a huge screen in the company of others.
