Dancing on Burn Scar



For 45 years, the powerhouse choreographer, dancer, and mentor cultivated diverse generations of dancers and built a studio against financial odds and political headwinds. This performance launches this anniversary season with the premiere of *Something to Think About*, Washington's homage to the late postmodern choreographer Rudy Perez and a revival of Donald McKayle's *I've Known Rivers*.
