Los Angeles, CA: On February 7, 2015, Dirty Laundry Lit and PEN Center USA will present DIRTY LAUNDRY LIT: OPEN, a love-themed reading featuring Golden Globe nominee, *Transparent* star Ian Harvie, former-SNL joke writer, Jeff Eyres, Guggenheim Fellow, Joshua Weiner, slam poet Food4Thot, YA writer Cecil Castellucci, editor Daniel Barron, essayists Yennie Cheung and Julia Ingalls. Curated by law professor, writer and creator of Dirty Laundry Lit, Natashia Deon.

The event, which L.A. Weekly has said, "Is more like a raucous, all-inclusive party than a reading" will be held at The Virgil in Hollywood and DJ Thing will perform live. He is also the editor of *At the Barriers: On the Poetry of Thom Gunn*, and the poetry editor of *Tikkun* magazine. The recipient of a Whiting Writers' Award, the Rome Prize from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, and the Amy Lowell Poetry Traveling Scholarship, he will be a Guggenheim Memorial Foundation Fellow in 2015. His poems and essays have appeared in *Best American Poetry, The New York Review of Books, The Nation, The American Scholar, Harvard Review, AGNI, The New Republic, and elsewhere.* He is professor of English at the University of Maryland, and lives with his family in Washington DC.

Cecil Castellucci is the author of books and graphic novels for young adults including Boy Proof, The Plain Janes, First Day on Earth, The Year of the Beasts, Tin Star, and Odd Duck. Her picture book, Grandma's Gloves, won the California Book Award Gold Medal. Her short stories have been published in Strange Horizons, YARN, Tor.com, and various anthologies including, Teeth, After and Interfictions 2. She is the YA editor of the Los Angeles Review of Books, Children's Correspondence Coordinator for The Rumpus and a two time Macdowell Fellow. She lives in Los Angeles.

Julia Ingalls is an essayist. Her work has appeared in the *Los Angeles Times*, *Salon*, *Dwell*, *Guernica*, and on KCRW, among others. She's into it.

Yennie Cheung, holds an MFA in Creative Writing from University of California Riverside, Palm Desert. Her work has been published in *The Los Angeles Times*, *Word Riot*, and *decomP magazinE*. A native of Southern California, she is currently working on a book about Downtown Los Angeles, slated for publication in November 2015.

Daniel Barron never planned on being a journalist, but after a year mired in post-grad ennui the film-student-turned-ad-hoc-reporter decided to combine a knack for the written word with a faith in the notion that most people really like talking about themselves. As the Editor-in-Chief of the arts and culture publication *Yay! LA*, Daniel interviews and profiles creatives in the fields of art, literature, music, and beyond. He has contributed to *The Rumpus* and *LA Music Blog* and can

usually be found writing, thinking about writing, hustling for future writings, and hating what he's writing. Incidentally, he also really likes talking about himself. Don't enable him.

Food4Thot is an established producer, writer, educator, businessman, and poet who utilizes spoken word to promote the innate greatness that resides in all beings. Coined the "prince of poetry" by the late, great Leimert Park poet D-Black, Food4Thot's extremely potent delivery is like an iron fist inside of a silk glove. A native of Watts, CA, Food4Thot later became the cofounder of Licky Thumbs Entertainment, DH Productions, and developed Lyrical Jinglist, a jingle-writing company focused in writing television and radio jingles for businesses looking to gain attention in innovative spectrums. This venture segued into The Still Waters Experience, a quarterly production he produces that features dynamic musicians, poets, authors, vocalists, visual artists, African dance and theatrical skits. Food4Thot's work includes CDs, school curriculums, and books. In 2010, Food4Thot launched Still Waters Publishing and Vibrations Holistic Center with his wife, Melanie Luja. He credits the many great people he's met and learned from with his success.
