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## Indonesia U19 Opened With Control, Then Let the Scoreboard Catch Up

Indonesia U19 began the AFF U19 Championship 2026 with a 3-0 win over Myanmar at North Sumatra Main Stadium in Deli Serdang on June 1. The scorers were Arkhan Kaka Putra Purwanto in the first half and Dimas Wicaksono Putra Rahman, with two late goals, in the 39th, 78th, and 87th minutes, as reported by AFF. The result put Garuda Muda level with Vietnam after the first matchday, with both teams opening on three points and a plus-three goal difference. The score looked clean. The work behind it was less simple.

### The First Goal Calmed the Crowd

Indonesia vs Myanmar U19 carried the usual pressure of a home youth opener: nervous touches, fast crowd noise, and a demand to win before the tournament had even settled. Indonesia started in an attacking 4-3-3 shape, with Arkhan Kaka leading the line and the wide players stretching Myanmar's back four. The first goal arrived before halftime, and that timing mattered because Myanmar had spent much of the first half trying to keep the game narrow and slow. Small observation: Indonesia's best early moments came when the ball was shifted quickly from the middle to the flank, forcing Myanmar's full-back to defend while turning. Once Kaka scored, the match stopped feeling like a trap.

### Market Reading Starts After the Nerves

Youth football rarely moves in straight lines because a good 20 minutes can collapse after one bad clearance. A match analyst looking at Indonesia U19 after the opening win would look beyond the 3-0 score: shot quality, duel success, pressing stamina, and whether the midfield kept the rest of the defense behind the ball. Adult fans comparing tournament form may place **1xBet Indonesia** alongside live scores, match previews, and odds movement when senior competitions or major fixtures are on screen. That habit should stay separate from youth development, but performance reading can still be disciplined. A young team that scores late twice usually tells the coach something about fitness and patience. Indonesia did not rush the final half-hour. That was useful.

### Pressing Made Myanmar Play in a Hurry

Myanmar U19's main problem was not only conceding three goals; it was how often it had to clear before building any rhythm. Indonesia's front line pressed in bursts, using the first pass into

midfield as a trigger rather than chasing every center-back touch. When Myanmar tried to play short, the nearest Indonesian winger could close the full-back while the central midfielder stepped high enough to block the return lane. Small observation: the second ball became Indonesia's friend because Myanmar's clearances often landed in the same central band, around 25 to 35 meters from the goal. That enabled Garuda Muda to launch repeated attacks without needing a long possession sequence. In youth football Indonesia, repeated pressure is often more valuable than a single pretty move.

## Late Goals Said Something About the Bench and the Legs

The second and third goals came late, which is usually where youth matches reveal conditioning and concentration. Dimas Wicaksono's doubles at 78 and 87 minutes did more than pad the score; they showed Indonesia still had runners attacking the box after Myanmar's defensive spacing had loosened. During long tournament nights, **live casino** belongs to another live-screen category, with dealer-led games, table limits, roulette, blackjack, baccarat, and quick session decisions replacing the rhythm of a football match. The comparison stops at real-time attention, because youth football is about development, pressure, and mistakes that coaches can correct the next morning. Indonesia's late scoring was the football point that mattered. A 1-0 opener would have been tense; 3-0 gave breathing room.

## The Group Outlook Still Had Vietnam Written on It

The AFF U19 Championship 2026 group picture became sharper because Vietnam also opened with a 3-0 win over Timor-Leste, with Cong Hau Hoang scoring a hat-trick. That put Indonesia and Vietnam together at the top after matchday one, turning their later meeting into the emotional axis of the group. Indonesian fans know this rivalry at the youth level: every duel with Vietnam carries old irritation, heavy comments, and the feeling that one loose touch can become a national debate. Football remains different because one youth tournament can become a national-team pipeline. The best young player here is not just chasing a medal; he is chasing a future call-up.

Kaka's first-half goal gave the front line a reference point, Dimas' late double rewarded persistence, and the clean sheet kept the back line out of panic. For Nova Arianto's group, the next layer is consistency: first touch under pressure, better timing on the final pass, and fewer rushed decisions when the crowd demands the killer ball. ASEAN youth competitions have always been harsh classrooms for Indonesian football because the opponents are familiar and the comments arrive instantly. Garuda Muda handled the first lesson. The next one was always going to be louder.
