# Library Foundation Announces New ALOUD Series, 'Branching Out'

The Library Foundation of Los Angeles has made its first announcement of programming under new Director of Public Programs Jessica Strand. The following is their press release.

The Library Foundation of Los Angeles' ALOUD series announces its new lineup of programs called Branching Out, dedicated to celebrating the lively and diverse communities in Los Angeles. Beginning this July, these programs will be held at parks adjacent to five Los Angeles Public Library branches across the city, including Vermont Square Branch Library, North Hollywood Amelia Earhart Regional Library, Memorial Branch Library, Lake View Terrace Branch Library, and Edendale Branch Library. Throughout the summer, library patrons can listen to readings, music, see dance, find food trucks, and more with performances by Fernando Pullum Community Arts Center, Herbie Hancock Institute of Jazz, Bob Baker Marionette Theater, a program curated by Black Lives Matter movement co-founder Patrisse Cullors, and readings by poets Marcello Hernandez Castillo and Tina Chang. More programming and readings for Branching Out to be announced.

"This summer we are exploring the city with programs that reflect the communities where each of these branches live. As we continue to bring ALOUD further into the city, we hope that people experience their local branches in new and interesting ways through this free, accessible programming," says LFLA Director of Public Programs Jessica Strand.

Adding to ALOUD's summer lineup is a new program collaboration with The New York Times, highlighting the paper's diverse offerings from arts and culture to food and climate all while reminding attendees that a Los Angeles Public Library card grants free online access to The New York Times.

ALOUD will also host a Lost & Found at The Movies program this summer with Dr. Heather Berlin in conversation with Lost & Found curator John Nein on the neuroscience of how our brains process films.

The ALOUD series is delighted to host these events for the Los Angeles community to further promote reading, creativity, and most importantly, free access to programs and services offered by the Los Angeles Public Library.
