Online Gambling

The Pandemic Effect

With the COVID-19 pandemic creating massive uncertainties globally, you would expect people to invest more into savings. For example, it would be wiser not to spend your hard-earned finances on unnecessary expenses. Interestingly, this has not been the case with the online gambling world. Australians dove into online gaming as though the world is ending tomorrow.

The trend is also quite notable in other countries too. Online gambling experts believe that the industry could emerge victorious or with the least financial damage in the post-COVID-19 era. The fact that the industry is easily accessible through mobile devices makes it even more attractive.

In Australia, the Australian Gambling Research Center (AGRC), which operates under the Australian Institute of Family Studies (AIFS), discovered the number of people gambling online grew from [79 percent to 83 percent per week](#). They also discovered that 32 percent more people now gamble at least four times or more per week. In the past, this number stood at a respectable figure of 23 percent.

This trend is more noticeable in not only males but also young people. Australians aged 18-34 years were more likely to delve deeper into online gambling during these COVID-19 times. Initially, Australians favored brick-and-mortar gambling venues. However, this changed when the pandemic forced the government to impose lockdowns and curfew.

Moreover, there is fear that members of the Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) communities are at more risk of jumping headlong into online gambling and embracing it fully. That is because they sometimes struggle to settle in the country and find alternative activities they can access

Crisis and Opportunity

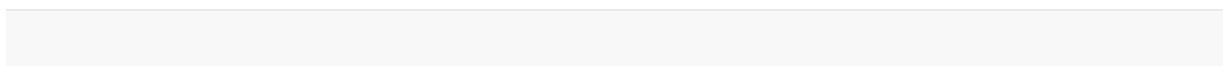
Most likely, you have also seen more of your friends develop this addiction. The chances are that you know many others who are on the verge of bankruptcy or serious family problems because of gambling.
