After the company's success with her 2019 *Snap*, Micaela Taylor has become the company's first artist-in-residence. Her newest work is described as a modern reconfiguration of Puccini's *Madame Butterfly*. The second premiere, *The One to Stay With*, was choreographed by Baye & Asa and debuted in the troupe's well-received shows at New York's Joyce Theater this past summer. Two legendary pop singers provide the soundtrack for the company's splendid dancers.
