Be Selective in What You Share

Customise Your Privacy Settings

Social platforms allow you to customise who sees your content. Set your profile and posts to be visible only to people you know and trust. Review privacy settings regularly since networks often make changes. Enable two-factor authentication for account security.

Think Before You Post

If you have any doubt about a post, it may be best to reconsider sharing it. This prevents any content from surfacing that jeopardises your digital footprint down the line.

Maintain Your Social Media Hygiene

Just like cleaning up your physical space, do some [digital housekeeping](#) occasionally. Review your social content and delete or archive outdated posts and photos. Limit past posts' visibility if you can't delete them. This keeps your social presence current and minimises accessible outdated information about you.

Avoid Linking Accounts

When downloading apps or creating new accounts, be wary of allowing access to your social profiles. Linking accounts can allow third-party apps to easily pull or share your social media data. Review the terms of service closely to understand how your information may be used or accessed. Whenever possible, create a new standalone account instead of linking to other profiles.

Limit Geotagging and Location Services

Location tagging attaches geographic coordinates to your posts like photos, automatically revealing exactly where you were. It's best to disable this function completely or be highly selective when manually adding a location to your posts. Also, [turn off location services](#) for social media apps on your smartphone so they can't track your physical whereabouts.
