## Summer AC Prep: Why a Tune-Up Checklist Matters

Everyone in the plumbing, electrical, and heating, ventilation, and air conditioning industries says the same thing every spring: most homeowners put off fixing their AC until the first hot day in June, and by then it's already too late. The house becomes stuffy, the system malfunctions, and all of a sudden, you're competing with every other home in the area on a Friday afternoon by calling a **local AC repair specialist**. The tale is well known. And an avoidable one.

Getting ahead of summer heat doesn't require an engineering degree. It just takes a little planning and, honestly, knowing what to look for. This is where having a good AC tune-up checklist becomes really helpful — not only as a formality, but also as a way to safeguard one of your home's more costly systems.

Here's a realistic explanation of what that entails and why, over time, avoiding it is typically the more costly option.

## Why Spring Is the Ideal Time for AC Maintenance

Spring gives you a window. The system hasn't been running hard yet, technicians aren't booked three weeks out, and any parts that need replacing can actually be ordered without waiting. AC maintenance done in April or May means you're not troubleshooting in 95-degree heat.

There's also the efficiency angle. Wintertime idle units may build dirt, lose refrigerant charge, or experience minor electrical problems that worsen over the course of a busy season. These are caught by a tune-up before they need to be completely replaced.

## Signs Your AC Needs a Tune-Up

Some indicators are obvious: the system isn't cooling the way it used to, or it's cycling on and off every few minutes. Some are more nuanced. Mold in the drain pan may be the cause of a faint musty odor when the unit turns on. Unexpected increases in utility bills frequently indicate that a system is overworking itself.

Unusual noises are worth taking seriously. Rattling can indicate a loose component. Grinding usually means something worse.

If your system is more than eight years old and you haven't had it serviced recently, that's reason enough. Age plus neglect is a reliable recipe for a midsummer breakdown.

## The Essential AC Tune-Up Checklist

Generally, a thorough AC tuneup checklist combines a DIY portion and a portion for a professional. Here are a few owner tasks: have the air filter replaced or cleaned (this single factor can drastically change the airflow and the efficiency of the unit), clean up any trash and leaves around the condenser unit outside, and ensure that all indoor air vents are open and not blocked.

At a professional visit, refrigerant levels should be measured, electrical connections and capacitors examined, thermostat calibrated, evaporator and condenser coils washed, and condensate drain line flushed. Particularly, coil washing is ignored. The entire system is less efficient when the coils are dirty as they reduce heat transfer.

The blower motor, insulation on the refrigerant lines, and the system's airflow vs your home's square footage should all be checked as well. All summer long, little inconsistencies build up.

## DIY Maintenance vs. Professional Service

Changing the filter and maintaining a clear area around the outdoor unit are tasks that every homeowner may actually manage. After that, things start to become tricky quickly. You need to be certified to operate with refrigerants. Electrical component testing requires tools most people don't have. And misdiagnosing a refrigerant issue as an airflow problem, or vice versa, can turn a \$150 fix into a \$900 one.

The DIY piece matters for routine upkeep. However, it is worthwhile to pay to have a professional

expert inspect the entire system once a year. Though it's not that anything is inherently bad, they'll catch things before they turn into problems.

## How Often Should You Schedule a Tune-Up?

It is recommended to run the system once a year for most residential systems, preferably in the late winter or early spring, before significant use starts. Doing it twice a year in the spring before summer and again before winter heating season makes sense if you run the system all year (common in warmer climates).

Older systems, units that run constantly, or systems in homes with pets or heavy dust benefit from more frequent filter changes and check-ins. These are solid AC maintenance tips that don't cost much but add meaningful lifespan to the equipment.

## What to Expect During a Professional Visit

A standard tune-up usually lasts anything from sixty to ninety minutes. In order to uncover operational issues, the specialist will run the system through its full cycle, inspect the indoor air handler and outdoor condenser, and often write up a report of their findings.

Ask for a reading of the refrigerant pressure, inquire about the capacitors' health, and confirm if the drain line has been flushed; these are some good AC maintenance tips from experienced technicians. These are easy to verify and tell you whether you got a thorough service or just a filter swap and a handshake.

## ***Akhnaten* Casts Its Spell at the LA Opera**

Philip Glass' *Akhnaten* is casting its spell at the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion through March 22 as part of the LA Opera's 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary season. The three-hour production, with two intermissions, doesn't so much unfold as it envelops.

What to expect: wave after wave of Glass' shifting harmonics, chant-like vocals, a maze of juggled spheres and clubs, and singers who cross the stage at a marvelously glacial pace, effectively seeming to stop time. The music, action and visuals emerge from the stage as a time warp mediation, never failing to entrance.

The opera, which Glass completed in 1984, is the culmination of his “portrait trilogy,” three works examining figures who reshaped human history. *Einstein on the Beach* (1976) took on science; *Satyagraha* (1980) explores Mahatma Gandhi and the birth of nonviolent resistance. *Akhnaten*, the most visually striking, explores religion. Its title character: the Egyptian pharaoh who, for 17 years in the 14<sup>th</sup> century BC, tossed out polytheism and turned toward the sun, worshipping Aten, the sun disk.

The score with its somber ancient feel draws its text from hymns, prayers, inscriptions, and letters—sung in their original Egyptian, Hebrew, and Akkadian.

Director Phelim McDermott first staged *Akhnaten* for the English National Opera, then brought it to the LA Opera in 2016 and the Metropolitan Opera in 2019 and 2022. Tom Pye’s towering scaffold-like sets are minimalist frames for Kevin Pollard’s dazzling costumes—animal heads, exotic plumage, regal draping, and lots of gold.

Sean Gandini’s acrobats and jugglers, used throughout the production, pair perfectly with Glass’ hypnotic score—the ever-ascending and descending balls mirroring Glass’ repetitive, driving notes.

At the center stands countertenor [John Holiday](#) as Akhnaten, new to the role with the LA Opera after performing it to acclaim in a Berlin production by director Barrie Kosky. “The voice is the voice of a shaman,” said Kosky of Holiday’s skill, in a November 2025 [interview with the New York Times](#). Holiday’s otherworldly voice, especially in the “Hymn to the Sun,” turns ethereal, sustaining phrases with a focused stillness.

Mezzo-soprano Sun-Ly Pierce renders Nefertiti in equal clarion tones, her demeanor conjuring a sacred aura around the royal couple. Soprano So Young Park, a former member of the LA Opera's Domingo-Colburn-Stein Young Artist Program, commands as Queen Tye, her steady presence filling the stage. The narrator-ghost—Grammy-winning bass Zachary James—reprises his role as the late Amenhotep III. He's magisterial while at once sepulchral, his resonant voice embodying the dynastic weight.

Filling out the political machinery that will ultimately destroy the pharaoh: tenor Yuntong Han as the High Priest of Amon, baritone Hyungjin Son as General Horemhab and bass Vinícius Costa as Aye.

The production marks Ukrainian-born Finnish conductor Dalia Stasevska's LA Opera debut. Stasevska masters the score, unfolding it patiently, expertly building on the cumulative force of Glass' trademark repetition.

The opera's three ritualistic acts each begin with symbols projected on a scrim—minimalist representations of hieroglyphic-inspired iconography.

The first act opens with the death of Amenhotep III who's laid out as a corpse. Priests remove his body's organs, placing them in canopic jars. Taken from the *Book of the Dead*, the ritual concludes with the pharaoh's heart that's ceremonially weighed against a feather—if equal in weight, his afterlife is guaranteed.

The last two acts logically follow as the new pharaoh reveals his monotheistic vision, banishes the old religion, builds a new city, dwells in insular harmony within it for many years, and then is attacked by the priests and killed. His son, Tutankhamun, is crowned, the former polytheistic religion brought back.

The scene shifts to modern day as a professor gives a lecture to students on ancient Egypt. Center stage, Akhnaten is presented as a museum statue, his name on a placard before him. But his ghost, along with that of Nefertiti and Queen Tye return, their voices rising, insisting on being heard across three thousand years.

## How to Develop a Winning Mindset for Success at Sports Betting

Most bettors lose money. The number sits around 97%, which leaves roughly 3% who manage to turn a profit over years of sustained action. That gap between the losing majority and the profitable few has little to do with predicting games better or knowing more about sports. The difference comes down to mental discipline, bankroll control, and the ability to recognize when your own

brain is working against you.

Sports betting rewards patience and punishes impulse. The people who survive long enough to profit understand this, and they build systems around it. They treat betting like a slow accumulation rather than a series of dramatic wins. They accept that most days they will sit below their all-time bankroll high, and they keep placing calculated wagers anyway.

## Your Brain Lies to You

Cognitive biases distort how people assess risk and probability. Three common ones appear in betting populations with regularity.

The Gambler's Fallacy convinces bettors that past outcomes affect future independent events. A coin lands heads 8 times in a row, and something in your mind insists tails must be due. Each flip remains 50/50 regardless of history, but the brain fights this mathematical truth.

Hot-Hand Bias operates in the opposite direction. A team covers 4 spreads consecutively, and bettors assume the streak carries predictive weight. Sometimes teams do perform well for sustained periods, but the bias leads people to overweight recent results against longer statistical records.

Loss Aversion creates the most damage. Research published in 2025 confirms that losses provoke stronger reactions than gains of equal size. A \$100 loss feels worse than a \$100 win feels good. This asymmetry pushes bettors toward chasing behavior, where they take increasingly risky positions to recover previous losses. The math worsens with each desperate play.

## The 1% to 3% Rule

Professional bettors stake 1% to 3% of their total bankroll on any single wager. This number appears conservative to recreational bettors, who often risk 10% or more when they feel confident about a pick.

The math explains the caution. Losing streaks happen to everyone, including the most skilled handicappers. A bettor with a 55% win rate will still face runs of 8, 10, or even 15 consecutive losses over the course of a year. Staking 3% per play allows the bankroll to absorb these streaks and continue operating. Staking 15% per play risks elimination before skill has time to show results.

Pros making around 1,000 plays annually expect to hit their bankroll peak only 5% of the time. The remaining 95% of days, they operate below their highest point. Accepting this reality separates sustainable bettors from those who quit after their first extended cold stretch.

## Reducing Cost Per Wager

Bankroll discipline extends beyond bet sizing to include where and how you place your money. Many sportsbooks run first-bet offers, deposit matches, and odds boosts that lower the effective cost of each wager. A bettor who reviews a **list of sportsbook promos and offers**, compares line shopping across multiple books, and stakes reduced-juice markets keeps more capital in play over time.

Small savings compound across hundreds of bets. Professionals making roughly 1,000 plays per

year understand that a half-point of saved juice or a boosted payout on select lines adds up faster than any single winning pick.

## Emotional Control Matters More Than Prediction Skill

Decision-making degrades under stress. When a bettor loses 3 wagers in a row, their next decision often comes from a reactive place rather than a strategic one. The body produces cortisol, attention narrows, and risk assessment becomes compromised.

Professional gamblers build systems that protect them from their own emotional responses. They set session limits before they start betting. They take breaks after losses. They define exit criteria in advance and follow those criteria even when it feels wrong.

Research on **decision fatigue** shows that quality declines after extended mental effort. A bettor who has spent 6 hours analyzing games and placing wagers makes worse decisions in hour 7 than they did in hour 1. Structured rest periods protect decision integrity.

## Record Keeping and Honest Assessment

Bettors who profit keep detailed records. They track every wager, the reasoning behind it, the odds obtained, and the outcome. Over time, these records reveal patterns that memory obscures.

Memory favors the dramatic. People remember the long shot that hit and forget the 5 favorites that lost. Written records correct this distortion. They show actual win percentages, actual return on investment, and actual performance across different bet types and sports.

Honest assessment requires accepting uncomfortable data. A bettor might believe they excel at betting totals but discover through their records that they lose money consistently on that market. Without data, the losing pattern continues. With data, adjustments become possible.

## Building Sustainable Habits

Winning bettors approach their activity with structure. They set aside specific times for research and specific times for placing wagers. They maintain separation between analysis and execution, reducing the influence of momentary emotions on final decisions.

They also accept the role of variance. A 55% bettor will lose 45% of their wagers. No amount of skill eliminates losing days, losing weeks, or losing months. The winning mindset treats each individual outcome as statistically meaningless while respecting the cumulative pattern over hundreds of plays.

## Conclusion

The 3% who profit at sports betting share common traits. They manage their money with discipline, staking small portions of their bankroll on each play. They recognize **cognitive biases** in their own thinking and build systems to counteract them. They control emotional responses rather than letting losses dictate their next moves. They keep records and use data instead of memory to guide future decisions.

None of this requires exceptional sports knowledge. It requires honesty about human limitations

and commitment to structured behavior over time. The edge in sports betting comes less from knowing which team will win and more from knowing how your own mind fails under pressure.



In October 2023, I attended the press opening of the LACMA exhibit “Painting in the River of Los Angeles: Judy Baca and the Great Wall” ([read here](#) my Cultural Daily article) and the closing in July 2024 when the panels were completed ([read here](#) my Village article).

Those panels were completing the 1960s, and the public was able to watch Baca and the other muralists paint them in real time. Then the large murals on canvas would be rolled up and placed in the [Great Wall](#) physical location, on the concrete banks of Tujunga Wash in the San Fernando Valley.



The painting of the 1970s panels continued at the SPARC location in Santa Monica's [Bergamot Station](#), but I did not go watch it there, so it was a delight to see the finished murals at the gallery. And there are quite a few more in the works, the goal being to complete the decade before the 2028 Los Angeles Olympics.

SPARC (Social and Public Art Resource Center) was founded in 1976, so this year marks their 50th anniversary.

In 1978, [Judy Baca](#) conceived of this public work to depict the history of California from prehistoric times to the present, and painted the mural with help from hundreds of youth volunteers and other muralists.

One theme runs into another in these very long panels, 12 feet high by 36 feet wide, as they depict significant events of the 1970s, "a decade of defiance and dreams," from various political activists' perspectives.




