She lived in the Massachusetts Bay Colony and died in 1672, more than 100 years before the Revolutionary War.

I am obnoxious to each carping tongue
Who says my hand a needle better fits;
A poet's pen all scorn I should thus wrong,
For such despite they cast on female wits.
If what I do prove well, it won't advance;
They'll say it's stol'n, or else it was by chance.
